I grew up in non-Christian family, so we did not know anything about God for my family; my mom worshiped Buddha as her God. So, before knowing God, I was a hot-tempered person; I could hit someone, even if it were just a tiny problem. Also, I mostly lived for myself, so it was hard for me to talk with people. I met God when I first moved to Michigan because I was new to the place, so I spent a lot of time with my family, especially my brother-in-law, whose name is Odie. One day, Odie and I were sitting on the porch to talk about things, and then I said, "Oh my God." So, Odie suddenly asked me, " Who is your God?" on top of my head, the only one I could think of was Buddha. Then, he introduced me to the Bible by saying one of the commandments, which is "Do not worship other gods before God" it made me curious about God and also nervous because it was the first time I saw my brother serious about something because he said, "if I do not know who Jesus is, I will not go to heaven since the way to go to heaven is through him."

My sister said I could pay to renew my immigration identity, and the scammer vanished too. Those things happened to help me know how powerful God is. ## New Gap Chapter Planting Model

For many years we at the Standing in the Gap Foundation and others have had the vision to expand Gap to other college campuses in Michigan. Many of you know that we have had Gap chapters on four campuses so far. We started at CMU in 1996, started SVSU's chapter in 2007, Ferris' Gap began in 2011, and Northwood's launched in 2017.

Unfortunately, CMU and Ferris do not currently have active Gap chapters. We learned some things, however, from what happened at those Gaps. In order to keep a Gap chapter going, growing and thriving, we need to have a strong church behind it. Our previous model for establishing new Gaps was to send a very small group (like just a couple people or one family) to an area and have them start both a church and a campus ministry chapter. That took a long time, significant finances, a lot of work and could really take a toll on folks.



Going forward, what we are planning to do now is recruit a team of 3-6 people who will commit to move to a community together for a period of at least five years. They will be trained by the Standing in the Gap Foundation and spiritually supported by The Church in Drive. (The Church in Drive meets both in person and on Zoom with our online worshippers participating fully in group discussions, small groups, church leadership, worship leadership, and more). The team will get jobs in the town and volunteer 10-15 hours a week toward launching the Standing in the Gap chapter on campus.

We are hopeful that this new model will help us establish new ministry chapters in a way that is more supportive of our ministers and more sustainable long-term. Please pray for those whom God would call to this work and for those of us who will be training, mentoring and supporting them!


